# Nunavut Climate Change Youth Advisory Committee



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# SUMMARY

The GN's Climate Change Secretariat, with support from NVision Insight Group, hosted the second annual in-person meeting of the Nunavut Climate Change Youth Advisory Committee (NuCCYAC) September 24-25, 2022. Members met to reconnect and create short and long term objectives for the committee.

The workshop revisited some of the goals and structure of the NuCCYAC from past working sessions to further inform the work of the committee. This included reviewing the Terms of Reference and creating a purpose statement for the committee. The committee also spent time grouping potential action items (Community, Territory, Government) and then mapping them by their impact and difficulty in implementation. These action items will guide the committee in their work until at least March 31, 2023.

The committee will continue to meet virtually to take action on outlined objectives and to determine future impacts the committee wishes to have in Nunavut.



#### **NuCCYAC Draft Statement of Purpose**

We acknowledge the climate in the North is changing and commit ourselves to raising awareness, empowering youth, and building youth capacity. With a focus on knowledge sharing, we take action on climate adaptation, emission reduction and energy efficiency through an Inuit perspective.

### Elder Solomon Awa

Solomon Awa provided a session to start the day where he shared his experience and knowledge of how climate change is impacting the land, communities and way of life in Nunavut. He introduced knowledge around weather patterns and events and their impacts on the snow layer, blizzard conditions and animal behaviour.

Solomon expressed optimism that traditional practices would help Inuit adapt as changes in weather and difficult harvesting years have always been something that communities prepared for and could anticipate by knowing what signs to look for (ie. red skies leading into winter mean that it will be a warmer winter and harder to travel on the ice, so preparations would need to be made before winter).

Solomon left the group to consider how the north will need to adapt to climate change. The impacts of climate change are felt the greatest across much of the arctic even though the north has very little impact on global climate change overall. As a result, a focus on climate adaptation may be needed more greatly in Nunavut than a focus on reducing climate change impacts.




